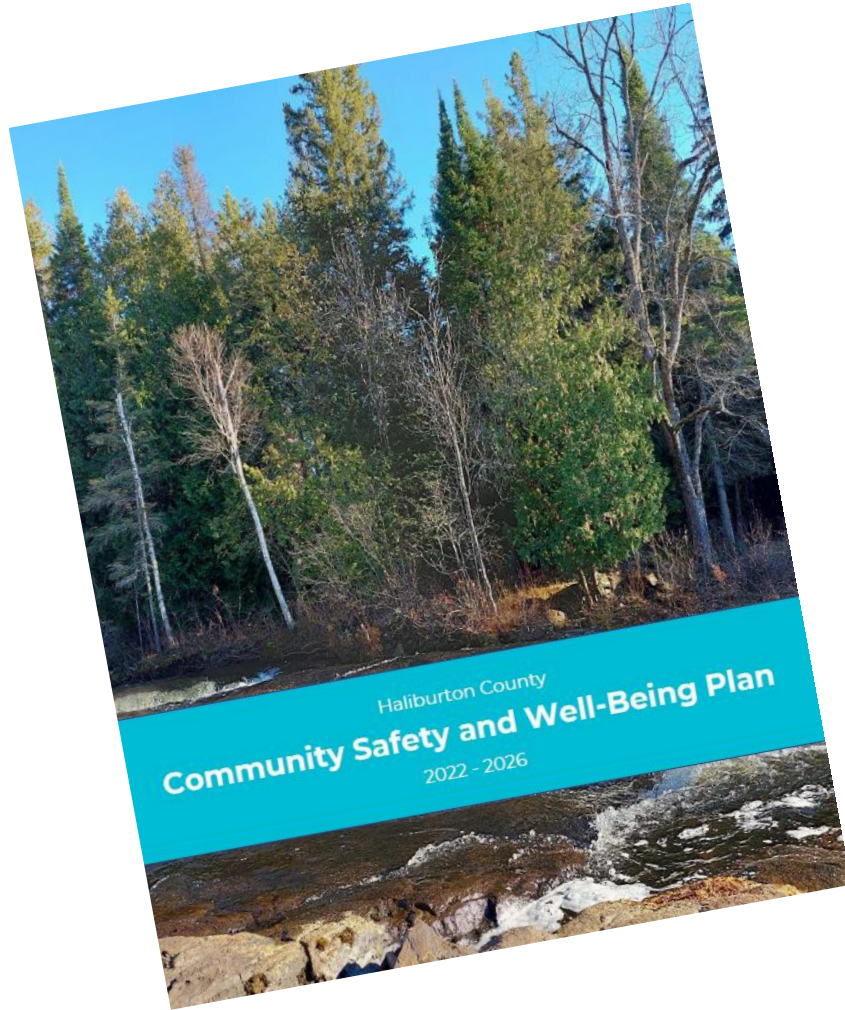

Funding and Capacity

Municipalities and service providers have limited resources and rely on provincial funding to support any increase in services.

Differentiated impacts on community members based on identity, health, age and income status, among other factors.

Environment and Climate Change

An aggravating factor to homelessness, poverty and mental and physical health.

Public Health Threats

Public health outbreaks drastically alter the way community services are delivered and how laws are enforced.

CSWB Data Stewardship

The Data Stewardship principle ensures that data is collected across key priority areas and across all of the Social Determinants of Health, more broadly, in a timely, integrated, and regularly updated manner.

The Working Group will consist of four leads, across each of the priority sectors, and will work closely with the respective Sub-Committees to ensure cohesion, collaboration, and improved information sharing across key service providers in the County. The efforts of this group should build upon existing initiatives in the region.⁶⁷

Four leads will drive Cohesion, Collaboration, and Information Sharing to help deliver the Community Safety and Well-being Plan.

Fire Services = eight stations

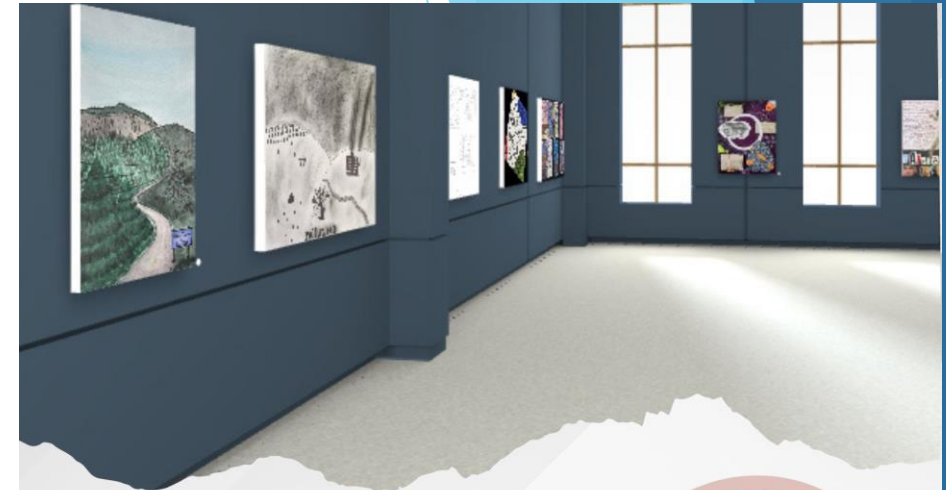
Paramedic Services = three bases

Helping Rural Stakeholders Identify Trends and Conditions Impacting their Communities.

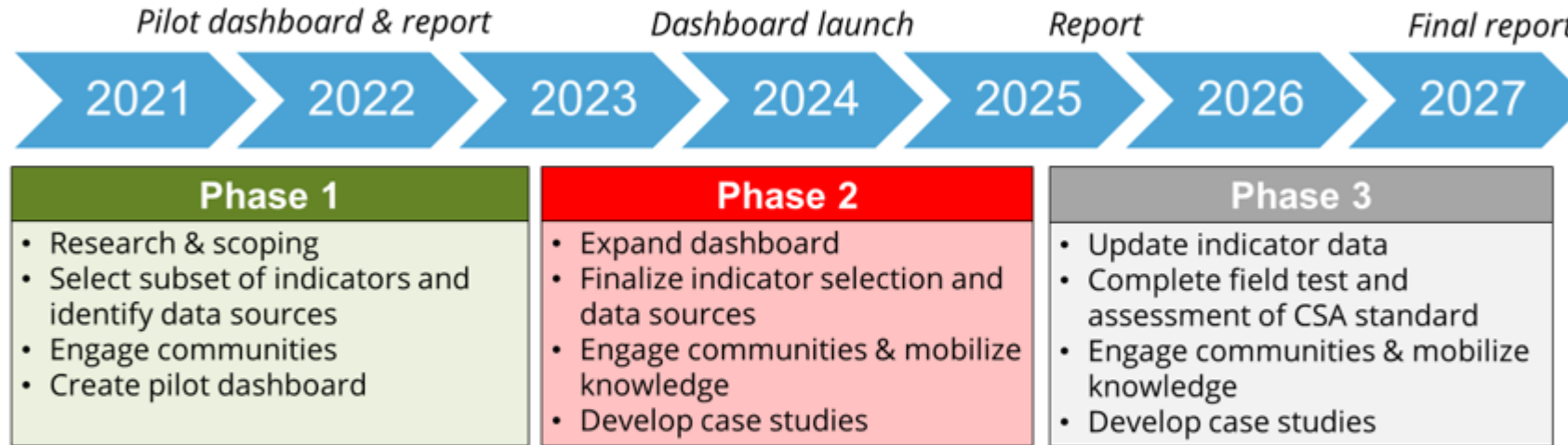
There are many systems for assessing quality of life and wellbeing. However, many of these systems were designed for urban areas, or rely on labour-intensive data collection and analysis. Rural communities require easy access to reliable information that is relevant to the rural context.

ROI is engaging with rural communities to create a wellbeing dashboard to display indicators selected from a new national standard ([CSA R113-22](#)). The goal is for rural communities to use the dashboard to assess and interpret their wellbeing. When complete, the wellbeing dashboard will enable communities to translate data into understanding and transform understanding into action.

Schedule and Work

Phase 2 Objectives

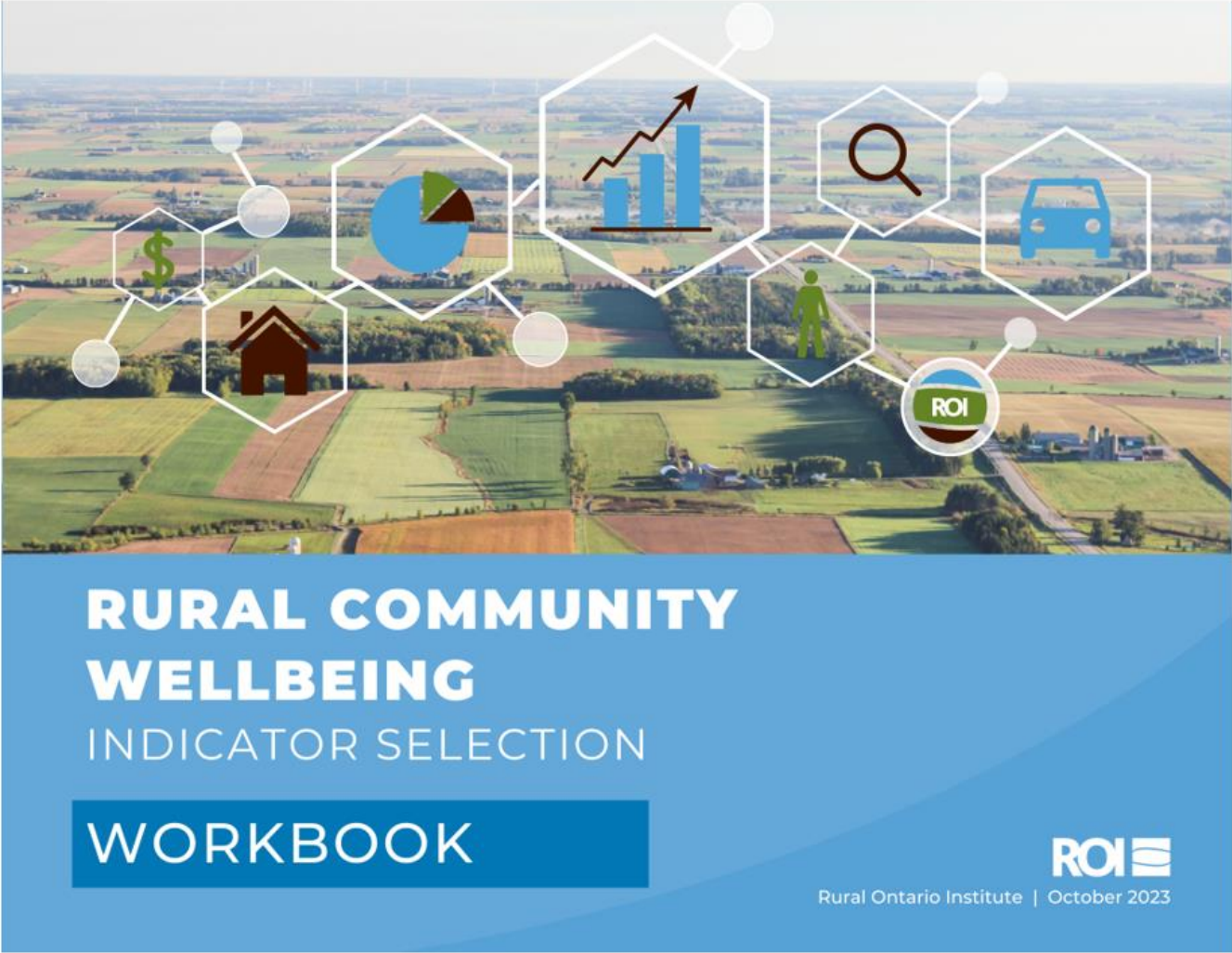
- 1) Create a user friendly & functional dashboard that is relevant and helpful for communities.
- 2) Develop knowledge mobilization resources and engage with communities.



Scope of work for Phase 2

- Develop a web-based dashboard to feature wellbeing indicators from CSA R113-22.
- Select/adapt CSA R113-22 indicators for which readily available data can be gathered and analyzed.
- Select a reasonable number of additional indicators that address gaps identified in CSA R113-22, if readily available data can be identified.
- Develop knowledge mobilization resources to assist with dashboard use and wellbeing assessment.
- Engage with Data Champions to get feedback regarding indicator/data relevance, dashboard design, and knowledge mobilization resources.
- Mobilize knowledge through resources and events.
